

### JULIUS CAESAR READING COMPREHENSION ACT 2 YEAR 5 AND 6

So much has happened already and there is so much more to follow. As we start act two, we find Brutus in his house. The storm is over and Brutus has found all the letters that were thrown through his window in the night. Do you think he's been convinced that Caesar should be dealt with? Let's find out....

"It must be by his death. He would be crowned How that might change his nature, there's the question Therefore think him as the serpent's egg Which, hatched, would grow mischievous And kill him in the shell."

It sounds like Brutus has almost made up his mind! This is all just as Cassius planned. Maybe Brutus needs a final push to get him over the edge.....

One by one Cassius named the men. We would call them "conspirators" now. They are people who are part of a "conspiracy" which is a secret plan. Decius Brutus, Casca, Cinna and Metellus Cimber. These are the men that Cassius has brought with him, these are the men that are prepared to do harm to Caesar.

Decius said, "Shall no man be touched apart from Caesar?"
