



## RELATIVE CLAUSES

A relative clause can be used to give additional information about a noun. They are introduced by a relative pronoun like **'that'**, **'which'**, **'who'**, **'whose'**, **'where'** and **'when'**. For example: I won't stand by the man who smells of fish.

In this example, the relative clause is **'who smells of fish'**. It provides more information about the man. The relative pronoun, **'who'**, is used to connect these clauses in the sentence
